I 'brought' our son Michael to represent all children growing up in a different culture who most likely have to adjust to another one in later years.

Others brought a diary with all their weekly appointments, or a compass or a cross made from some special wood. Someone else brought a Moringa plant - that nutritious wonder plant that is helping to feed so many people in a community.

This was something we were asked to do when Larry, Michael and I recently had the amazing opportunity to go to Johannesburg and participate in a gathering of missionaries from all over Africa. Africa is so huge, each country having its unique culture, richness and challenge, and you can imagine many interesting things were brought to that table.

During this Easter season - we remember that some simple things were brought to another kind of table at a farewell supper. Bread and wine. Jesus showed them to his friends and told them that they represented his love and sacrifice of his life for them - and not just for them, but for those who came after them. Just as it inspired me to see other missionaries bringing something so meaningful and personal
